

WHO is eligible to apply for NMDA's Healthy Soil Program grants?





We welcome applications from two (2) applicant types



1. ELIGIBLE ENTITIES

2. INDIVIDUAL APPLICANTS

- New Mexico's "local governmental [entities] with proven land management capacity to support healthy soil", including:
 - Pueblos, tribes, and nations
 - Acequias
 - Land grants
 - Soil and water conservation districts (SWCDs)
 - NMSU Cooperative Extension Service
 - Other parties meeting the Eligible Entity definition above
- **Application period:** January 15-March 19, 2025
- Awards of up to \$100,000.00 (including mileage + 15% administrative fee, both of which NMDA pays to the Eligible Entity itself)

- New Mexico's non-governmental parties that are directly engaged in farming, ranching, or another form of land management:
 - Individuals
 - Businesses
 - Nonprofits

The webinar for INDIVIDUAL APPLICANTS happens today at 3 p.m.

- Application period: January 15-March 19, 2025
- Awards of up to \$24,999.99 (including mileage + 15% administrative fee, both of which NMDA pays to the Individual Applicant's Project Sponsor)






WHERE can

Healthy Soil Program-funded projects happen?



Healthy Soil Program projects can happen...



- Anywhere in New Mexico
- On any type of operation: cropland, rangeland, irrigated pasture, forest land, orchards, vineyards, gardens...
- Where there's an existing relationship to the land: either the Eligible Entity owns it, leases it, manages it on another's behalf, or partners with local landowners to perform work on it
 - Bottom line: The Eligible Entity must have landowner permission to implement a soil health project on land it doesn't own
- On any amount of land: Projects can be measured in acres or square feet

Healthy Soil Program-funded projects happen?



WHEN NMDA's Healthy Soil Program grants happen

Projects can last up to ~15 months, starting mid-July 2025 and ending September 2026

July 2025		August	September	October	November
December		January 2026	February	March	April
May		June	July	August	September 2026



WHAT projects are eligible for NMDA's Healthy Soil Program?



NMDA's Healthy Soil Program grants fund on-the-ground projects involving 1+ of the 5 soil health principles:

3. Maximize 4. Maintain 5. Integrate animals into land 1. Keep soil 2. Minimize covered. disturbance on biodiversity. a living root. management, including grazing animals, birds, beneficial insects or cropland and minimize keystone species, such as earthworms. external inputs. Planting a Growing long-Grazing crop residues Minimizing Growing tillage on different cover crop season crops

EXAMPLES practices arising from the 5 soil health

principles

- Leaving crop residues in the field to decompose
- cropland
- Minimizing farm inputs (applying the 4R strategy)
- plants
- Increasing the diversity of a crop rotation
- Planting a cover crop following a short-season crop
- Following a bale grazing plan
- Planting pollinator habitat

- = project led by an Individual Applicant (non-governmental party directly engaged in farming, ranching, or another form of land management)









